

ST. PETER'S LIVE SIMPLY AWARD - CARING FOR GOD'S CREATIONS...

To support with the school's Live Simply action plan, St. Peter's has formed a Gardening club that has been running for the last term. This includes members from both the school council and Eco Club. In developing the prayer garden, the children have been focussed on weeding and planting specific plants, in particular ones which will attract bees in order to support plant growth in the local community. The school's site supervisor has been involved too, sharing his expertise showing the children how they can reuse lavender cuttings to make new plants. Various year groups have also supported with the development of the garden area through Science lessons - this has included sunflowers from Year 1 and broad beans from EYFS.

As stewards of God's creation we have been given an incredible privilege to provide new habitats and biodiversity for many of God's creatures and children at the school have shown they understand their responsibility to care for and nurture God's creations.

In the Book of Genesis, we are called to till and care for the garden of the world (Gen 2:15).

"Tilling" refers to cultivating, ploughing or working while "keeping" means caring, protecting, overseeing and preserving. This implies a relationship of mutual responsibility between human beings and nature"

LONDON FULL OF OPPORTUNITIES FOR OLSB



Part One

Back in April, Our Lady and Saint Benedict Catholic Academy in Abbey Hulton, were notified that the school had been shortlisted in the category of Outstanding Progress in a primary school by the Education Business Awards. They were invited to London for the awards ceremony. On 12th June, the Principal, Sarah Clowes and Vice Principal, Janine Exon, travelled to the Leonardo Royal London St. Paul's Hotel, where the winners of the 2024 Education Business Awards were announced. The awards celebrated the incredible achievements in all aspects of school life. The winners of the 2024 Education Business Awards were revealed, shining a light on the outstanding achievements of schools and academies across the UK.

The award for **Outstanding Progress - Primary School, sponsored by Action Mats** was awarded to Our Lady and Saint Benedict Catholic Academy.

The award was presented by Ashley John-Baptiste - a young BBC broadcast journalist and presenter who has a remarkable story of how he overcame his troubled childhood to study at one of the world's best universities.

The school was noted for its strong relationships between pupils, their families and staff which has helped Our Lady and Saint Benedict Catholic Academy move from 'requires improvement' in 2019 to 'outstanding' in its latest Ofsted report last November. Led by Principal Sarah Clowes the rapid progress has been attributed in part to prioritising reading, with pupils able to use vocabulary with precision and great confidence. Opportunities to benefit from outdoor learning are provided for all pupils.

Mrs Clowes commented 'I want to say a big thank you to our children, families, and staff for all the hard work and support that they have given on this journey to outstanding which has led to us receiving this award. We are proud to bring the award back home to Stoke-on-Trent. I am immensely proud of the school. I am delighted that the progress that has been made in the school, (which is due to the hard work and dedication of all of the staff) has been recognised through winning this award. The school are very proud to be part of The Newman Catholic Collegiate who have supported the school on its journey to Outstanding. It has been a huge team effort where rapid improvements have taken place which are allowing our children to flourish. I wish to congratulate the whole OLSB family on the award.





Part Two

She joined their assembly where she spoke to the pupils about her role as an MP and answered lots of questions. She was very impressed with the school's wonderful pupils and thanked the staff for everything they have done to make the school the wonderful place that it is.

At OLSB they try to provide the pupils with as many opportunities as possible to build cultural capital and to see and experience life beyond the local area of Abbey Hulton. This is only possible due to the dedication and support of its wonderful staff team. This, along with the pupils and families is what makes OLSB the very special place that it is.

ST. JOHN THE EVANGELIST ARE WORKING HARD ON SUSTAINABILITY AND ARE PLACED RUNNERS UP IN THE PRIMARY AWARDS FOR GREEN EDUCATION IN SCHOOLS (PAGES) 2024

This term the school were delighted to find out that they had been selected as a runner up in the Green Action Takers category of the Primary Awards for Green Education in Schools (PAGES) 2024 with their project 'Sustainable Development'.

Almost 35,000 young people were involved in the creation of entries for this year's competition with lots of diverse approaches that schools in the UK are taking to deliver environmental education to their children.

"With over 270 entries received, it was a very difficult decision to select our winners and runners-up, so you and all of the children involved should be very proud of this achievement.

"We thought your presentation was excellent and the videos really helped to bring your work to life. It was lovely to see so much environmental learning across the different year groups. Special congratulations to the Eco Council for spearheading all the great environmental work!" (PAGES Judges 2024)

The school has a certificate to commemorate their achievement and a prize of £200!

The children have worked extremely hard over the year on different aspects of sustainable development across the whole school including:

- Before the new build, they nurtured cuttings from the original prayer garden so that the school didn't lose any species of plant
- They always replant their seeds from the different flowers that they grow
- They grow, harvest and eat their own vegetables
- The Nursery children have been making greenhouses out of lollipop sticks and plastic


- sheets to watch germination. They made their own garden canes from a bamboo plant. They also replanted all of their indoor seedlings outside when they were ready and are continuing to track their growth
- The school's Early Years children have planted strawberries inside their old wellies
- They recycle rainwater that they use for watering the plants
- They use a moisture monitor to check on the plants so that they don't overwater them
- They have completed the Better Planet Schools module on Food and Farming
- They have a very active bug hotel
- They've planted over 200 trees, during and since the new build
- They've completed community litter picks throughout the year
- They recycle their paper, cardboard, plastic and food waste
- They've been awarded Newcastle in Bloom Best School prize in their area for the past seven years and the judges loved their entry this year - so fingers crossed!



LIBRARY UPGRADE FOR ST JOSEPH'S PUPILS

Pupils at St Joseph's Catholic Academy love to read! We know that: "The more that you read, the more things you will know. The more that you learn, the more places you'll go."



Pupils also get to take home a book prize when they've completed lots of super reading at home and written about it in their Reading Logs.

With so much reading, the school library is very well used. Recently, the library was 'Closed For Refurbishment' whilst the school worked to upgrade it. They were proud to help others by passing on the books that they no longer needed to local and international charities so that other children can enjoy stories too. The children were very excited waiting for the new library launch! The school bought lots of new books for its library; it's now full of exciting and interesting books by authors such as Tom Palmer, Jess Butterworth and David Almond. They have numerous fiction and non-fiction books linked to areas of the curriculum as well as a range of new poetry books and picture books too.

Along the library bench, stand some beautiful nonfiction books for children to get lost in. These hard backs are wonderfully illustrated and some stand



children's attention and teaching them about the world.

The team of Pupil Librarians are eagerly awaiting their training so that they can take responsibility for keeping the library tidy and organised and can help other children to choose new books. "Recommended Reads" and "If you liked...Try these...." posters (as well as recommendations from others) help pupils to vary their reading and to try new books and authors.

Every class visits the library at least once a week to browse the fiction and non-fiction books and choose a book to take home. Class Storytime takes place in the library once a week too. The school is very grateful for the funding secured to purchase new books for its library upgrade.


St Joseph's has also taken part in the SKYARTS Access All Arts programme recently. Nursery and Reception have listened to music and made connections to places they have been to or people they know. KS2 children have made connections with rhythm patterns, by editing a score of Old MacDonald and then playing their own variations on tuned instruments such as recorders and glockenspiels.





OUR LADY OF GRACE PREPARE FOR LIVE SIMPLY AWARD

Preparing for the Live Simply award was an exciting adventure for Our Lady of Grace pupils. First, they brainstormed ways to make the school and community more eco-friendly. They decided to focus on reducing waste, saving energy, and helping those in need. Pupils made posters to encourage recycling and set up recycling bins in each classroom. They each took turns being "energy monitors," making sure lights were turned off when not in use and reminding everyone to unplug devices. They also organised a pre-loved uniform sale where the community were encouraged to donate used uniform to the school to enable its families to purchase them. Working together on these projects made the children feel like they were making a real difference.



Achieving the Live Simply award was a proud moment for all the school. After months of hard work, they presented their projects to the Live Simply judges. The judges were impressed by the school's efforts and creativity. Pupils showed them their recycling posters, the compost bin, and photos from the clothing drive and many of their other projects to live sustainably. They explained how being energy monitors helped reduce electricity usage in the school. When the school received the award, the children felt a sense of accomplishment and realised the importance of living simply to protect the planet. It was a great lesson in teamwork and environmental stewardship that they will carry with them forever.
